Have you ever imagined what it would be like to be a pastor? Let me welcome you into some of my experiences. Often times I get a phone call, or someone drops into my office unexpectedly. Frequently, they start with the words, "I don't want to interrupt what you are working on...but do you have a couple minutes?" or, something like that. I know this is a common courtesy, but I take it very seriously when people say that. The reason I take it seriously is influenced by a devotion that I was reviewing as a possible Advent "freebie". Henri J. Nouwen writes...

God's Creative Ways

Get yourself up on a high mountain, O Zion, bearer of good news, Lift up your voice mightily, O Jerusalem, bearer of good news; Lift it up, do not fear. Say to the cities of Judah, "Here is your God!" –Is. 40:9

A FEW YEARS AGO, I MET an old professor at the University of Notre Dame. Looking back on his long life of teaching, he said with a funny twinkle in his eyes: "I have always been complaining that my work was constantly interrupted until I slowly discovered that my interruptions were my work."

That is the great conversation in our life: to recognize and believe that the many unexpected events are not just disturbing interruptions of our projects, but the way in which God molds our hearts and prepares us for his return. Our great temptations are boredom and bitterness. When our good plans are interrupted by poor weather, our peace of mind by inner turmoil, our hope for peace by a new war, our desire for a stable government by a constant changing of the guards, and our desire for immortality by real death, we are tempted to give in to a paralyzing boredom or to strike back in destructive bitterness. But when we believe that patience can make our expectations grow, then fate can be converted into a vocation, wounds into a call for deeper understanding, and sadness into a birthplace of Joy.

When God interrupted my adrenaline-filled, risky, and faithless teenage years with a broken ankle, I was forced to slow down and hear the gospel of Christ. When someone asks for a couple minutes, you're not interrupting me, you are asking me to do what God has given me to do as your pastor.

With that in mind, don't feel like you are imposing when you wander into my office, text, or call me on the phone... unless you interrupt another interruption, but even that can provide an opportunity for growth in whatever way God wants. Prepare your hearts to be interrupted by Christ unexpectedly and you may just meet the Messiah anew!

National Health Observance for April is Stress Awareness





What is the connecting link between body and mind?

The head-heart-body connection affects everything from your physical health to your mental and emotional well-being. Wellnessismorethansimplytheabsenceofdisease. It is an active process directed toward ahealthy, happy, and fulfilling life and includes not only physical but also psychological and emotional dimensions.

This connection is mediated by a complex network of nerves, hormones and neurotransmitters that communicate with each other via the vagus nerve. The vagus nerve runs from the brain to the gut.

Head/brain: The head/brain connection is responsible for cognitive functions, such as thinking, reasoning, learning and memory. It is also where you make decisions and solve problems.

Heart/brain: The heart- brain connection is responsible for emotional functions, such as expressing and regulating emotions, feeling empathy and experiencing courage and confidence. It also plays a role in social interactions and overall behavior.

Gut/brain: The gut-brain connection is responsible for physical functions, such as digestion, absorption and elimination. It is also involved with intuition and immune function.

When your head-heart-body connections are working in harmony, you experience better physical and mental health, increased creativity, improved performance and greater happiness. However, when the connection is out of balance, you can experience a range of problems, including illness, disorders and mental health issues

Head-heart-body connection can be improved by becoming more aware of how your head-heart-and gut are interacting. When presented with a situation, pause and consider which connection is dominant at the time; brain, heart, or gut. Pay attention to bodily sensations and listen to the combined wisdom communicated by your head, heart and gut.

Ask yourself these powerful questions:

- 1. What is my rational brain telling me?
- 2. What is my emotional heart telling me?
- 3. What is my intuition telling me?
- 4. How can I improve my decision based on the answers to these questions?

By understanding and strengthening the head-heart-gut connection, you can improve your physical, mental and emotional health, improve your energy level and live a happier and more fulfilling life.

The head-heart-body connection is a complex and fascinating system that plays a vital role in our health and well-being. By taking the time to listen to all three sets of information communicated by the brain, heart, and gut, you can make wiser and more fulfilling choices that support your overall well-being

Devotional: Prayer for Open Hearts and Minds

January 10, 2024

Praying for our leaders, especially those in elected office, came up in conversation during a fall 2023 meeting of the Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania (LAMPa) Policy Council. Several people mentioned that it was difficult for members of congregations to do this in front of their fellow churchgoers, especially when it involved naming specific leaders and offices. Mere mention of an elected official's name can elicit a sharp response, especially in our times of political polarization. It is at play in our expressly political institutions as well as in our families, our communities and our church.

This polarization, and how to begin to depolarize both ourselves and our interpersonal relationships, was the topic of a LAMPa fall workshop on depolarization as an act of discipleship in a democracy. While the conversation did not linger on prayers for elected leaders and the role of

"so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places."

these prayers in worship, it did bring to the surface the challenges we all face in embracing others in their fullness and complexity – across our sense of division, brokenness, and different understandings of our values. That fullness and complexity is at the heart of our common humanity and yet is so often overlooked in our world. This happens in part because of polarization but also because of the harms and injustices of colonialism, white supremacy and other dehumanizing modes of oppression.

For me, praying for elected officials and candidates—and for all our leaders and community members, regardless of title or status—is a call for them to bring open hearts and minds, to open to the "mystery" of God, and to be open to be changed by it through Christ. It is also an act of hope, that peace and justice might be made real and that the Spirit of wisdom and revelation will allow our leaders to see our neighbors as they really are, fully human and fully loved by God.

Caring about what our leaders do, and acting on that care, is an expression of our love for our neighbors and our faith in a future, transformed by Christ, that we are part of bringing about. When officials and candidates belittle our neighbors here and around the world, consider them deserving of unending bombardments and military assaults, and name them as threats to the United States and its supposed way of life, often defined in Christian nationalist terms, we fall short of seeing that humanity.

Our prayers are important. And our actions make our witness known to our leaders—as disciples and agents of change for God's world.

Reflection questions:

Is praying for elected leaders part of your Christian practice? How do you view it?

What does it mean in public life to see one another as fully human and fully loved by God?

What might candidates for elected office be talking more about if they demonstrated that viewpoint?

Christianity and the Tao That Tells Itself David Clay / 3.11.24

In Nacho Libre, that comedic triumph from 2006, Jack Black portrays a Catholic friar who spends his days cooking for the residents of a Mexican orphanage and his nights in the ring as a luchador. Early in the film, an emaciated street thief named Steven mugs Nacho; after the two battle each other, the friar recruits his attacker as a tag-team partner. Steven adopts the fitting moniker "Esqueleto" ("Skeleton").

There is a problem, however. Esqueleto has never received baptism, deeply scandalizing his devout partner. "I don't believe in God," Steven proclaims with evident disdain, "I believe in Science." His devotion to Science does not preclude him from suggesting various folk remedies to their lack of success in the ring (e.g., magic eagle eggs), but Nacho suspects that his comrade's unbelief is really to blame. In a theologically dubious — but hilarious — move, Nacho forcibly baptizes Esqueleto before one of their matches. Esqueleto's conversion, unsolicited as it was, appears genuine enough; later, when their fearsome final opponent strolls into the ring, it is the former devotee of Science who suggests praying to the Lord for help.

Although he demonstrates no familiarity with any scientific learning at any point in the film, (pre-baptized) Esqueleto nevertheless appears guilty of espousing "scientism." Usually a pejorative label, scientism in its strongest form is the notion that scientific methods are the only genuine path to knowledge. More commonly, it refers to the attitude that confidence in our truth claims is, or should be, proportional to their scientific rigor. The further we move from statements that can be investigated by the hard sciences, the squishier our language becomes, and the less certain we can be that we are saying anything meaningful. Any talk about the fundamental nature of reality, or the meaning of life, or God, should be treated with extra suspicion.

This anti-metaphysical bent has probably been around forever, but it gets particularly sharp (and famous) expression in the philosophical movement known as Logical Positivism, which originated in the 1920's. As is the case with any philosophical school, there was much variation and disagreement amongst its adherents about the particulars, but the Positivists' main idea was that any meaningful statement is either a truth of logic or else empirically verifiable (at least in principle). The consequences of such a view are profound. All the venerable old propositions about God, the meaning of life, the immortality of the soul, the nature of universals — in short, any statement that purports to deal with the metaphysical — is not so much false as it is meaningless. From a cognitive standpoint, these propositions fail to say anything.

By 1960, Logical Positivism had run aground on <u>technical issues</u> regarding what, exactly, counts as "verification" or "confirmation." Long before, the movement had suffered repudiation from the enigmatic Ludwig Wittgenstein, whose 1921 Tractatus Logico-Philosophicus had served as a major source of inspiration for the movement. Wittgenstein's book, which he began writing as a soldier in the Austrian army during World War I, is widely regarded as a landmark in philosophy, and even more widely regarded as hard to understand. Very simply, the Tractatus seeks to draw an indelible line between what can and cannot be meaningfully said by human language.
