Safe Churches Don't Change the World (Intended as a peptalk from Pastor Matt)

Wait, aren't we supposed to be a safe place? Of course we are! Church is a place where people should work to provide a place that is safe from physical, mental, emotional, social, and spiritual harm. When author Sam Rainer says, "Safe churches don't change the world."* He is specifically referring to the way Jesus' followers are commissioned, even commanded, to change the world through the sharing of the gospel.

Sam references Acts 17:6, following Paul and Silas proclaiming Jesus as the Messiah, the Judean people in Thessalonica formed a mob to find Paul and Silas. In describing the message of the early missionaries, the mob said, "These people who have been turning the world upside down have come here also...!" Turning the world upside down! That's what the message of the Messiah does, it changes everything.

"You become an Acts 17:6 church by first being an Acts 4:20 church", Sam explains. Acts 4:20 describes what happens after Peter and John are captured, when Peter proclaims to the leaders of Israel,

"This Jesus is 'the stone that was rejected by you, the builders; it has become the cornerstone.'12 There is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among mortals by which we must be saved."

After hearing this, the rulers ordered Peter and John to stop preaching and teaching in Jesus' name. Peter and John replied to the rulers, "for we cannot keep from speaking about what we have seen and heard." When the followers of Jesus cannot stop speaking about what they know and believe, it has a world-changing result.

As Jesus' followers, we are called to follow Jesus. It seems the word "follow" doesn't have the same understanding these days. When Jesus first said it, people dropped everything and left what they were doing immediately (Matt. 4:18-20, Mark 2:14). With Jesus in the flesh, it seems people take on this "followship" to a higher level. Take a few minutes to reflect alone or with another person.

- How have the "Jesus followers" in today's church, responded to Jesus' call to follow?
- How is that different from the way the first disciples responded?
- What would the church look like if Jesus was the gravitational center of your life?

When I consider these questions, the image is that of a different expression of being the church. In some ways it's exciting to think of ministry in these ways. In other moments, it feels very difficult to wrap my mind around the contrasts presented. It's easy to get lost in thinking or talking about what could be. The imagination might wander or feelings of being insufficient creep in, discouraging me and others from acting.

Remember, Jesus didn't only call upon his followers to listen, consider, or ponder on the Word. Jesus acted and told his followers to act as well. When the discouraging thoughts or fear crept in, he simply said "do not be afraid." After that he acted to take away the fear by commanding the winds to stop, the illness to leave, and demons to be cast out.

Not stopping there, Jesus also gave the Holy Spirit to act in these ways through his followers. This is where the world started to turn upside down. When his followers could no longer keep from speaking about what they had seen and heard.

So, what is it you have seen and heard about Jesus? If you were told to longer share that with anyone, would you be able to stop?

Be encouraged, Jesus says, "So make up your minds not to prepare your defense in advance; 15 for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict" – Luke 21:14-15. Along with saying this, the Bible is full of events where God shows up to make things work for good. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight. 6 In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths" – Prov. 3:5-6.

The expenses for the month of July were \$14,021 and the income for the month was \$13,380. While expenses for the month were again greater than income, the difference this month was that expenses were only \$641 more than income. The year-to-date expenses of \$102,125 exceed year-to-date income of \$80,262 by \$21,863. The monthly deficit was lower again this month so our deficit is now averaging just over \$3,100 per month.



Atrial Fibrillation



Atrial fibrillation, also known as Afib or AF, is the most common type of heart arrhythmia (irregular heartbeat). The US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that up to 6 million people in the US have Afib.

When a person has Afib, the beating in the upper chambers of the heart (atria) is unpredictable and sometimes rapid. As a result, blood doesn't flow as well as it should from the atria to the lower chambers of the heart (ventricles). Normally, the heart beats 60 to 100 times per minute. When a person has Afib, the heart rate can be as high as 175 beats per minute.

Atrial fibrillation is not life threatening. However, the irregular heartbeats associated with Afib can cause blood collect and potentially form a clot. The clot could break free and travel to a person's brain, causing a stroke. The National Stroke Association reports that Afib raises a person's risk for stroke by 500%, and Afib-related strokes cause more deaths than other strokes.

Diagnosing and treating Afib may prevent 60 to 80% of strokes, according to the American Stroke Association. Sometimes people with Afib will not have any symptoms. However, others may experience one or more of the following

- Irregular heartbeat
- Heart palpitations (rapid, fluttering, or pounding)
- Dizziness or lightheadedness
- Shortness of breath
- · Chest pain or pressure
- Extreme fatigue

Afib generally does not go away. If you experience an irregular heart rate and/or feel any of the above symptoms, immediately call your Health Care Provider. A health care team can explain the various treatment choices and help you develop a plan of care.

Treatment for Afib can include:


- Medications to control the heart's rhythm and rate
- Blood-thinning medication to prevent blood clots from forming

<u>StopAfib.org</u>, is global atrial fibrillation patient organization that has helped lead the Atrial Fibrillation awareness campaign, which is designed to increase the understanding of Afib and better inform patients and health care providers about this complex condition.
