On January 28, 1986 I remember being at a friend's house for a scout meeting. Soon after the small group of 4th graders sat down together, we watched as the space shuttle, Challenger, launched into the sky. We were in awe as the giant rockets propelled the shuttle at Mach 1.92 (1473 mph). When it reached an altitude of 46,000 feet, 73 seconds later, we saw an explosion and then it broke into pieces. This left me wondering again about how much we have achieved in space travel.

During the same time of my life, I remember watching movies about astronauts, Star Wars, and Star Trek. Space was a fascinating thing! In addition to NASA and other government groups, several private organizations have now developed private companies to facilitate space launches for satellites and exploration. Now there's conversation of trying to land humans on Mars and other planetary bodies. And yet, we are still only thinking within our own solar system.

I occasionally visit the 18th Space Defense Squadron information page to learn more about space. This is the group tasked with identifying, tracking, and sharing information on objects entering, leaving, or orbiting our earth. Currently, they monitor an estimated 47,800 space objects. However, that's not the end of what they monitor, they also monitor additional debris that is floating around the earth at over 17,000 mph! Imagine the amount of damage that could do if it were to collide with an object. It would be catastrophic!

Of course, I had to do a search for a video illustration of what this may look like. If you're interested, check out the European Space Agency video on YouTube called "Distribution of space debris in orbit around Earth". After viewing that, my impression of what outer space might be like has changed. The level of shock I had was similar to what I experienced while watching the Challenger explode.

With my awareness of all the garbage, my innocence was lost. The image of a clean and open passage into the unknown was destroyed. Needless to say, I was happy to read that there is an effort to clean up the garbage. I'm sure this will be a very difficult task to say the least.

Learning of all this garbage and the danger it presents, the protection provided by the earth's atmosphere and gravitational properties make it possible for us to stay alive in ways I never knew. I marvel at the way God has provided for this planet. God's creation of all things on earth and in the cosmos is beyond our comprehension. Isaiah 40 says,

We ended the year with an outstanding December offering of \$23,137, almost double our typical monthly offering. It did not wipe out our debt for the year, but with December expenses of \$13,168 for the month, we ended with a December surplus of \$9,969! Our yearto-date expenses of \$179,167 exceed year-to-date income of \$149,729 by \$29,438. However, I was expecting a deficit closer to \$40,000, so \$29,438 does not look so bad.

We are headed into a new year full of unknowns, but we travel the road with faith and with each other.

The tragic assassination of Brian Thompson, CEO on Unitedhealthcare, has put the focus on the healthcare industry and its problems.

Researchers at the Commonwealth Fund analyzed the health care process, efficiency, equity and health outcomes in 10 advanced countries. The USA ranked #10.

We face the most barriers to accessing and affording health care. We rank last in health outcomes, including acute illnesses, chronic diseases, and death; we live the shortest lives and have the most avoidable deaths. We have the highest infant mortality rate. We are #9 in equity, providing care for those of different background and income.

Problem: denial of claims. Denial rates from health insurance companies range from 22-33% among the major companies. There may be problems with prior authorization, documentation of care, inaccurate data, or "oot medically necessary." This puts an additional burden on both providers and patients attempting to appeal and resolve the denial.

For Medicare Advantage plans (2021) only 6% of 35 million claims were denied. Only 11% were appealed, but the denial was overturned in 82% of those cases.

About medicare...

There is original Medicare A & B (pays for medical care by hospitals and doctors, including urgent care, assuming they have agreed to accept Medicare), Medicare D (prescription plan). Cost of Medicare b in deducted from social security. Medicare D (many plans) is private pay.

ADVANTAGE: you can go to any doctor or specialist (without referral) who accepts medicare and use any hospital. You will pay a percentage of the cost unless you have a Medicare Supplement plan which you pay (there are many from which to choose).

Additionally, there are multiple Medicare Advantage plan You have to continue paying Medicare B but there may be little or no premium for the MA plan.

ADVANTAGE is low cost and additional benefits, e.g. eye and hearing care. Disadvantages: copays for services, need for prior authorization to see specialists, limited to provider network, increased cost if using provider not in network.

MAKING YOUR EXPERIENCE BETTER: Prepare. Make copies of your insurance cards. Print your medicine list including over-the-counter pills and your doctor's name and phone number to carry with you. Before a doctor visit, write down questions and problems.

Reconciling In Christ Bishop Candea

At the 2024 Central States Synod Assembly, we adopted a resolution to become a Reconciling in Christ Synod, a public statement of welcome, inclusion, celebration, and advocacy for people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions as well as a commitment to the work of racial equity. The resolution also included the adoption of the following statement of welcome:

Traveling the way of Jesus, who commanded his followers to love one another as Christ has loved, and believing that all persons are created in the image of God, this synod welcomes people of every race, background, age, political affiliation, economic and social status, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, and mental and physical ability. As a synod we strive to enable all people to participate fully in the life and work of the church in the ministry of Jesus Christ.

I am often asked why such a statement is necessary. We know that Jesus loves everyone, and that everyone is welcome. Why then do we point out and name specific groups of people, such as the LGBTQIA+ community? Because our neighbors need our specific and direct words of affirmation, welcome, care, and love. I have always appreciated Martin Luther's response on why we do good works. He states that we do good works, which includes our words, not to earn a reward for ourselves, not to prove our righteousness, but because our neighbor needs them.[1]

Our neighbors who are part of the LGBTQIA+ community have heard the public proclamation from our newly inaugurated president that their lives and relationships are not recognized in the government policy[2] if they do not conform to a binary understanding of gender identity. This makes it even more vital that they hear the message of God's word that those in the Queer community, those who are transgendered, and those who are non-binary in their gender expression and understanding are beloved of God and reflect the image of God in whom they are made.

As the bishop and pastor of the synod, I publicly proclaim that you who are part of the Queer community are brave and beautiful. You reflect the incredible diversity of God's creation. You refuse to conform to binary limited categories that seek to define your personhood. You instead trust who God has created and called you to be, continuing to witness to the love of God and the ways we can express that love through our communities where all are welcome.

As the bishop and pastor of the synod, I also publicly say to those who view the government policy as a reflection of Biblical teaching, that you are no less one of God's beloved. I believe that you do desire to live faithfully and do good works out of love for your neighbor. But I urge you for the sake of your neighbor to open your hearts even wider, to wrestle with those Biblical teachings, that you might hear Scripture as a beautiful love story between God and God's people, remembering that the purpose of Scripture is to reveal Christ, the Word of God dwelling among us. As the gospel of John puts it,

These things are written so that you might come to believe (trust) that Jesus is the Messiah, and that through believing you may have life in his name." John 20:31

For Christ is the one who is reconciling us to one another. It is hard to see at times how we can come together across so many differences, but in Christ, we are already one body. May we continue to reflect on the reconciling work of Christ, be merciful to one another, walk humbly with one another, and reflect the love of God for all creation in all our words and actions. Our neighbors, those who are part of the Queer community, those who are immigrants, those who are the most vulnerable, need not only our statements of welcome but our bold and loving actions. This is indeed the work of the church.
