The Season of Lent

The season of Lent is beginning. Lent is not a common word in our society today. You probably only hear it if you go to a church that celebrates the tradition, fish fries on Fridays, watching the news covering Mardi Gras, or there might be a small segment on how various Christians in other places observe the season. Perhaps you have a memory of soup suppers and Wednesday evening worship services at church (much less practiced these days).

Several years ago, it came to my surprise when one of the local non-denominational pastors, Bill, asked about how his church wanted to try to have an Ash Wednesday worship service. They'd never done it before, and he asked if I had any resources to share. As a Lutheran, of course I did! I had more resources than I knew what to do with. I handed them off and wished him a happy planning.

About a month later, Pastor Bill thanked me and gave me some feedback on what I shared. He told me that what he was looking for was something to connect his congregation with the ancient tradition. Something that would help to ground them in a practice that presented the Christian faith as something that transcended denominations, generations, cultures, politics, or worldly things. He was able to find good direction in the purpose of Lent as a season of repentance, marked by the physical display of ashes, showing faith and commonality with all of Jesus' followers.

While Ash Wednesday was new to those in his congregation, some of the mainline Christians would quietly reflect, "It's about time!" All sarcasm aside, the sharing of this tradition ended up being an opportunity for Christians in our community to see more commonality and understanding. In previous years, there seemed to be a divide between mainline Christians and "Evangelicals". But the sharing of this simple tradition started to open minds. It started to mend some of the feelings of disconnect within the quiet separation that had somehow crept in over the years.

Thinking about Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent, it is a witness to the way in which the church is a witness to God's holiness. It is a season of God making us holy, not through us becoming anything better-than others. But instead, us being humbled as those who have come from the dust and to dust we will return... dust. This is a recognition of the work of Jesus Christ in dying for our sins, cleansing us by His blood sacrifice, and rising from the dead to proclaim and guarantee freedom from sin and the promise everlasting life. This all makes us, who are otherwise not worthy, into a people cleansed, blessed, welcomed, and empowered with the riches of God in Christ.

Holy – set apart for God's purposes. Not our purposes, but God's purposes. We are set apart from common things in order to experience and live into the life God has for us. This season, join me in focusing on how we can daily see Jesus more clearly, love Jesus more dearly, and follow him more nearly. Remember, it is about God's actions, for God's purposes, for God's people. Something all Jesus' followers share, and all are to benefit from. With Jesus at the center of it all, divisions fall by the wayside and being together in God's grace brings all together.

March is National National Kidney Awareness Month ••• March 11 is World Kidney Day

Chronic Kidney Disease (CKD) is a progressive condition in which kidneys don't work as well as they should to filter waste, toxins, and fluids from your body – which can cause serious health problems.

Kidney Disease Statistics:

- 1. 37 million Americans have kidney disease.
- 2. Kidney disease is growing at an alarming rate. It currently affects more than 1 in 7 (15% of American adults).
- 3. Black Americans are 3.4 times more likely to develop kidney failure.
- 4. 9 out of 10 people with kidney disease are unaware they have it.
- 5. Diabetes is the top cause of kidney failure. About 1 in 3 adults with diabetes have kidney disease.
- 6. Nearly 570,000 Americans are on dialysis.
- 7. Nearly 240,000 Americans are living with a kidney transplant.

The symptoms of kidney disease:

Symptoms may vary depending on what stage you are in, many people don't experience symptoms until the later stages when kidney failure occurs. It is beneficial to be aware of and look out for the following symptoms of early-stage kidney disease:

- High blood pressure
- Swelling in legs
- Foamy urine
- Frequent urination

- Swelling in hands/feet
- Weakness or fatigue
- Dry itchy skin
- Muscle cramps

Diabetes can lead to damaged or weakened blood vessels, preventing the kidneys from filtering waste and toxins from your blood.

<u>High blood pressure</u> can damage your blood vessels over time, including hardening and narrowing of arteries around the kidneys, preventing them from functioning as they should.

<u>Cardiovascular disease</u> can lead to narrow or blocked blood vessels, reducing the supply of oxygen-rich blood supplied to the kidneys, which may lead to kidney disease.

If you have a **family history** of kidney disease, you may be at higher risk for developing CKD.

Can early-stage kidney disease be reversed?

Unfortunately, most early-stage kidney disease cannot be reversed. However, taking action early to protect your kidney health can help you slow the progression of the disease. Take control of your health by making healthy lifestyle choices and speaking with your health care provider frequently to identify any changes in your health.

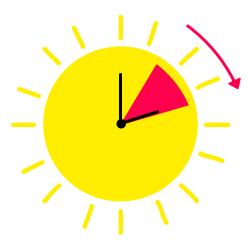
